Helbert and Wilfred Surerus as members of class No. 5; Tillle Schluchter, Lizzle Hartz, Maud Kibler, Rebecca Kraft and others in class No. 7; Class No. 8 had Mrs. Calvin Young for their teacher . . . members were Jennie and Annie Briggs, Lydia Kraft and Mary Hartz; there were eleven classes listed . . . also records written in German.

Mary Sott was the first woman sent to Annual Conference.



Church History

The first missionary of the Evangelical Church to visit the Cavalier area of Dakota Territory was the Reverend G. W. Hielscher, who came in 1879. Rev. Hielscher was pastor of the Fargo mission at the time, a work which had been under auspices of the Minnesota

Conference. Upon his arrival in this community, he found several members and interested friends of the denomination. These folks were pioneers in the area, having come from Ontario, Canada to settle east of Cavalier. They had been holding unorganized services in the German language in the home of Christian

Fischer. Reverend Hielscher preached his first sermon in a schoolhouse two miles northeast of Cavaller, using the text from Mark 10:17, "Good Master, what shall I do that I may inherit eternal life?" Besides Mr. Fischer and his family, Mrs. John Rickbell, John Heyrock, John Bechtel, and John Well, Sr., were instrumental in establishing the work of our church in this community.

John B. Well, Sr. came to Cavaller July 31, 1875. He was the grandfather of Flossle (Mrs. Harvey Restemayer) and Alice Well. Other church members that are descendants of Mr. Well are: Isabelle Restemayer Sommer, four of her five children, Tom Tim, Lynn and Joni (Mrs. Don Latozke); also, Rutt Ann Well (Mrs. Niel Schluchter) and her two daughters, LuAnn and Diane (Mrs. Mike Vistad).

John Heyrock was born about 1851 in Great Britian. He came to Pembina County in 1879 and became a citizen in 1884. Witnesses for the naturalization ceremony were George A. Farrow an H. R. Vaughn. (from records at the county Courthouse).

1881 — February 20, First baptismal entry - b Rev. A. Schmidt. Emma Mathilde, daughter of John F Ricbkell and Diana (Kaercher). Emma was born March 28, 1879 in Huron County, Ontario - baptized I Pembina County, Dakota Territory. Their son Friederich Samuel was baptized in 1883.

The sixth, seventh and eighth entries show the baptismal of a Samuel, Mary Ellen and Ada Clara children of John Heyrock and Susanna (Schluchter), I the years 1880, '82 and '83. Rev. E. F. Movius performs the 3rd service.

In 1880, at the annual session of the Minneso Conference of the Evangelical Church, Cavaller ar surrounding area was taken up as a regular preachir place. Since this included such a large territory, th work became known as the Pembina County Missio and was divided into northern and southern section This new mission reached as far south as Mayville Traill County, north to the Pembina River, east acro the state boundary to Crookston, Minnesota, and we into Langdon territory.

Because there was a rapid growth in membersh and an increase in the number of preaching a pointments, the mission was divided at the Annu Conference in 1881. The northern half was known as the Pembina County Mission with Rev. A. C. Schmillassigned as its pastor; the southern half was named the Grand Forks Mission and it was served by the Rewm. Tesch.

(A book containing records of conferer meetings dated 1880-1893, written in German by Reverends Schmidt, Movius, Ortli and Suckow is w the church records. It may be seen upon request.) In 1881, the first log church, 30 x 40 feet, was built about two miles southeast of Cavaller at a cost of \$400.00. These were logs that August Krinke had cut to build his own home, but instead they were given and used to build a house of worship. This Church was

named ZION Evangelical Church. It was dedicated on October 30, by Bishop Rudolph Dubs. This was the second Evangelical Church in North Dakota, the first one was Fargo, which had been dedicated just a week before on October 23. Shortly after the dedication of Zion Church, thirty-four souls were won to the Lord.

(The original warranty deeds that show the purchase of the land used by the Zion congregation for their church and cemetery are kept by Herb Schluchter also the original sale agreement written by Christlieb Fischer, owner of the land.)

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In 1882, another congregation was formed— IMMANUEL Church. This church was located about 8 to 10 miles southeast of Cavalier in Lodema Township. A small frame building was used for worship. In 1888, with the Reverend Wm. Suckow as pastor, the IMMANUEL Church building was replaced by a new frame structure at a cost of \$800.00.

Due to the large area of the Pembina County Mission, known as the Cavaller appointment, it became necessary to assign assistants to help the regular pastors who were serving the charge. It was also during this time that a two-year time limit for service was in force—thus calling for frequent moving and shifting of pastors.



In 1883, The Reverend Ernest Movius came to the Cavaller circuit, replacing Rev. A. C. Schmidt. During his three-year stay, 103 souls were brought to Christ. It was also during his ministry that the first parsonage

was built. John Bechtel donated the lots for this building. The house was 18 x 26 x 14. A barn was also constructed — 16 x 24 x 12. The total cost of this project was \$860.00.

In 1885, another church named TRINITY was built in Cavaller city. Mr. John Bechtel donated three lots on which its building was constructed. A frame structure, 26 x 40 x 16 was erected at a cost of \$818.92. On

the day of dedication, December 30, 1885, all bills were paid with money left in the treasury. TRINITY Church was the first congregation of the Evangelical Church in the Dakota Territory where services were held in the English language.

During the ministry of the Reverend Leon Koch and the Reverend John Buente, a new frame building was erected at the ZION appointment two miles east of Cavalier. It was dedicated debt-free December 16, 1888, by William Horn, of Cleveland, Ohio, editor of the Christiche Botschafter, editor of the denominational

periodical. Its cost was \$3,145.00. Rev. Koch, Rev. Buente, Jerry Kaercher, Henry Well, Philip Koehler, and John Well, Jr., composed the building committee. This was a year of great difficulties and many problems mingled with moments of unusual spiritual joys. After the church building was completed, a revival was held and ten souls found Christ. Three persons came to a knowledge of Christ in the IMMANUEL Church in the same year.

1893 — A copy of the Christmas program listed 35 numbers consisting of recitations and songs by young and old. Some of the people participating in the program were Maud Kibler. Rebecca Kraft. Elia Heyrock, Edna Ortli, Mr. W. Well, Milton Kibler, Lettitia Snell and Norman Zinn.

In May of 1889, the Sixth Annual Session of the newly formed Dakota Conference of the Evangelic Church, (which had been organized in 1884), was held ZION Church. A total of \$4,000.00 was given to missions in the Dakota territory.

It was during the ministry of the Reverend R. W. Teichmann (1895-1899), that a Sunday School near Pembina and a preaching place near Bathgate (McArthur) were started. Again, spiritual results poured forth when 46 found Christ. It was also during this time that a Women's Missionary Society and a Young People's Alliance were organized at TRINITY Church.

ZION Church was struck by lightning in August, 1900, and destroyed. The very next spring a new building was erected and dedicated by the Rev. L. Umbach.

Reverend E. J. Bechtel became pastor at Cavaller in 1904. During his ministry, a great revival was held and 53 people came to Christ. It was also at this time that TRINITY Church was enlarged at a cost of \$2,600.00; a classroom, vestibule, and balcony were added. Another meeting was conducted and 45 persons were won unto Christ.

The Reverend Floyd Breaw came to be pastor of the field in 1925. Again, the work of winning people to Christ and of building became the task of the people. In November of 1926, ZION Church completed a basement project. Bishop John Dunlap was the speaker for the occasion. Such a need was also realized for TRINITY Church, and two years later, its congregation finished a basement project. Bishop L. H. Seager was the speaker and the cost of the work totalled \$2,800.00.

In October of 1935, while the Reverend E. J. Schroeder was the pastor, the congregations of ZION and TRINITY were united to form one single congregation. This made the Cavaller charge one of the largest single congregations in the North Dakota Conference of the Evangelical Church. The congregation was known as TRINITY.

Many improvements were made by the congregation over the next decade. The Reverend August G. Martin was assigned to the parish in 1938. Realizing the need for Sunday School space, the congregation began a building fund in 1939. In 1940, the 60th Anniversary of the field was observed and at that time the building fund was promoted. The Sunday School unit was constructed in 1941. The sanctuary was also refinished. An oil painting of Christ knocking at the door, carpeting in the chancel and aisles, and a communion table were among the furnishings added. The tollowing spring, the Annual Conference was held in Cavaller.

During this time also, the Men's Brotherhood was organized, the Church and parsonage modernized with water and sewage facilities. Also, the congregation began the liquidation of the Conference debt, (which accumulated as a result of the depression in the 1930's), by giving \$3,600.00 in pledges and \$2,500.00 in cash gifts.

In 1943, Reverend Martin was elected Super tendent, and the Reverend Ira E. Herzberg w. assigned as pastor. During his nine years of minist 100 souls were won to the Lord. This period of tir found numerous additions of items which enlarged t church's ministry as well. A tower chime system w installed. A Hammond organ was purchased and dedication concert given by Dr. Teyet Lamara-Ch. White Feather. Other memorials included a pulc flower vases and stands, velvet curtains to enclose t chancel, an illuminated cross on the church steep hymnals, candleholders, a baptismal font, pulpit larr a sound movie projector, a slide projector and screen Worship centers were also provided for the You Department and the Children's Department. A host other usable and appreciable Items were also co tributed. Many of the foregoing gifts were given memorials.

Denominational Activities — Church Ur

On November 16, 1946, the Evangelical Chur united with the Church of the United Brethren in Chr at Johnstown, Pennsylvania. The church then becaknown as the Evangelical United Brethren Church

In May of 1951, the North Dakota Conference at the South Dakota Conference of the Evangelical Unit Brethren Church were officially united and known the Dakota Conference. These two conferences hipperviously been one conference, beginning in 1884, then Dakota Territory, but were separated into the single conferences in 1920.

Further deliberations concerning church un were held with the Methodist Church, and on April 1968, in Dallas, Texas, these two denominations wi officially united into what is now known as the Uni-Methodist Church. Following this union, a move agwas made to unite the Annual Conferences either in the North Dakota Conference or Into the South Daki Conference. On January 6-7, 1969, the Uniting C ference of the newly formed North Dakota Conferen United Methodist Church, took place at St. Pai Church in Jamestown, North Dakota. The Unit Session of the newly-formed South Dakota Ann Conference took place on January 8, 1969, at Hur South Dakota. Thus again, former EUB members one Dakota Conference, found themselves divided I two separate conferences.

Trinity Church now is a part of the North Dak Annual Conference.

1883 — October 29 - First recorded marriag Wm. Beker from Ontario and Eliza Livinggood . . . Re Movius presiding . . . witnesses were Wm. Kraft a Lovina Kraft. Reverend Ralph Dunn was assigned as pastor in 1952. During his ministry, the church kitchen was remodeled, dishes and silver service added, a drinking fountain installed, dining tables given, and small chairs for the children's department procured.

Additional work has been done throughout the years. It is impossible to list all that has been taken care of in maintaining the church's work throughout the years. In January of 1970, the south half of the basement was remodeled at a cost of \$3,800.00.

Rev. Kenneth K. Koth became pastor of the church in 1955. Several events of significance took place in the parish during his ministry. The congregation observed its 75th Anniversary on September 20-25, 1955. The 73rd Annual Session of the Dakota Conference of The Evangelical United Brethren Church was hosted by this congregation from May 9-13, 1956. At that Conference, seven ministers were ordained to the Order of Elder, among them was James Stein, a son of Trinity Church. A girl's singing group called "God's Echoes" was formed in 1957. Remodeling was done in the parsonage. The property to the north of the church and parsonage was purchased for \$8500. This gave the congregation one half of a block for expansion purposes.

Rev. Gideon Eberhart was assigned to the charge in 1960. During his ministry visual-aids, particularly filmstrips, were added to the educational departments of the church. Also, an emphasis was made on church camping, and numerous children and young people of this congregation participated in these summer experiences. A play, given at Easter one year, was sponsored by the Men's Brotherhood. Both men and women participated in this play and proceeds from this event were used to help children and young people go to church camps. In 1961, Mr. Stanton James, representing missions on a denominational level, led a three-day harvest festival in the congregation. The congregation adopted partial support of a \$1000. per year for Miss Ruth Elmer, missionary to Japan. This support has been carried faithfully through the years. Also, the congregation began to share more ecumenically with other congregations in town. The Pioneer Rest Home was begun in May of 1962 and pastors from Pembina County as well as Cavaller share in a weekly ministry to its residents.

Rev. Elmer A. Sprunk came to Trinity Church in 1966. It was at this time that the Evangelical United Brethren Church and the Methodist Church established closer ties on a national level. An official union of these two denominations took place on April 23, 1968, in Dalias, Texas. Trinity Church became part of the North Dakota Conference of the United Methodist Church. Also, during these years the church's educational library was expanded, additional filmstrips and audiovisuals were added for use in this department of the church. Discussions were begun regarding the construction of a new parsonage. A building committee was selected and proposed plans for a project were considered.

Rev. Theodore B. Rath was assigned to the parish in 1968. Several major projects were undertaken by the congregation which included both church and parsonage. In January of 1970, the south half of the church basement was remodeled, and during the winter of 1971, the north half of the church basement was also completed. Paneling was placed on the walls and all floors were carpeted. The 90th Anniversary of the church was observed on November 15, 1970. The church steeple, a prominent architectural feature of this area, was removed in April of 1973 for safety reasons. Later, the church bell was mounted on a cement slab in front of the church building. Plans to secure a different parsonage were again reviewed in 1977 and a second building committee was elected in January of 1978. Proposed plans for a parsonage were approved on April 6, 1978 and construction of this house was begun in late May. The new home, costing \$68,000 was completed in early March of 1979 and Rev. Rath moved with his family into the dwelling on March 13.

The old parsonage, which had been home to numerous ministers for about 75 years, was removed from its foundation in November of 1979. The house was moved to a location southwest of Cavalier where it is currently used as a home for a young family. Also, remodeling was done in the church sanctuary during the winter of 1980 with paneling placed on the lower four feet of the walls and carpeting placed on the floor. The theater-like seats in the west side room were removed and replaced by cushloned chairs.

More Faithful Servants

Vic and the late, Julia Fisher, were very active in the growth of this church. Vic held offices of every level in the E.U.B. church including local, state and denominational level; served as delegate to Annual and General Conference; was state president of the E.U.B. Men's organization; selected as "Trustee at Large" for Westmar College for 15 years; just to name a few of his accomplishments.

They had three children, Bob, Marilyn and Geoline. Bob and his wife, Esther (Dietrich) and their children, Doug and Sheryl are members of this church.

Vic's father, Fred, joined the church in 1909 during G. E. Bohner's ministry . . . his mother, Margaret, joined in 1898 when L. S. Koch was pastor.

McArthur was one of several preaching points that were served during the history of our church. It was located east of Bathgate. This preaching point was established during the ministry of Rev. R. W. Teichman who served in the years, 1895-1899. Later a church was built. In 1930 this church was sold and moved to Cavalier where it is being used as the Assembly of God Church.

When the McArthur church closed, the John and Margaret Dietrich Sr. family came to this church. They had been in the Bathgate-McArthur area since before their marriage in 1900. Carl Deck, Mrs. Dietrich's father, was an active church member. He also gave the land for the McArthur cemetery.

Our first church records of the Dietrich family show that Mr. and Mrs. John Dietrich Sr. and four of their 15 children joined the church in 1929. Children joining were John Jr., Jake, Florence and Rose. Other descendents of John and Margaret that are members of Trinity United Methodist church today are: Alan Paul, son of Albert and Rose (Dietrich) Paul; two of Jake's children, Esther, (Mrs. Bob Fisher) their children, Doug and Sheryl and Mr. and Mrs. Dennis Dietrich and Stephanie; Mr. and Mrs. John (Martha Hartz) Dietrich, Jr., Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Dietrich and Richard, Mr. and Mrs. Fred Kiemele (Esther), her son and family, Freddle and Carole, Scott and Bret.

Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Kraft were ploneers in this area in 1878. One of their daughters, Irene, has made Cavalier her home since she was born. She has always been very active in church and community work. Some of the jobs in the church were more rewarding then others. She started teaching about 1924 and taught in the children's department for 30 years . . . "I really enjoyed being with the children . . . they were always so unpredictable but willing to please." "I was the planist for the children, treasurer of many organizations; first president of the Progressive Workers organization . . . now I'm an honorary member; also printed the church bulletins for Rev. Martin." Irene was also employed at the court house and at the hospital as a bookkeeper and various other jobs.

During her many years as a teacher, many humorous incidents occured . . . this is one of them . . . "One Sunday, during class, I was telling them about Mary crying and the tears falling on Jesus feet and how Mary used her hair to wipe them dry . . . (no one seemd to be paying attention) . . . 

The Progressive Workers Class was organized in 1923 at the home of Estelle Fisher Spiller under the leadership of Mrs. Fred Fisher, mother of Vic Fisher. At this meeting the group elected Irene Kraft as its first President and Estelle Spiller the first secretary.

The following poem written by the late Mrs. Vic (Julia) Fisher tells about the work accomplished by this organization thru the year

When the hospital came to Cavaller, A nursery was needed, you see, One thousand dollars was the goal, To accommodate King Babeee.

That project was bravely tackled, With a vim no one can forget: Now hundreds of bables have used it. And the end is surely not yet.

They reached out to Samaria. To Kentucky's Mission field: Children's Homes and hospitals, To such urging did they yield.

Then earth's uttermost parts beckome Maimed Korea's cry did ring; To three little homeless orphans, New cheer and joy they bring.

Hundreds of dollars were given, Through years that came and went; The lowly dime was the beginning. Of all the money that was spent.

Ten cent dues went on for years. But couldn't keep much alive: So everyone, cheerfully consented. To each month, bring twenty five.

But cost of living kept soaring, Debts closed in like a fence; Then by nineteen sixty-three-action, Monthly bit was fiffy cents

There were other sources of income, From sewing, and baking, and art With each one doing her part.

Baskets and wondersheets were sold, Dolly Duzzits, by the dozen; A cookbook was edited and published To keep the funds a buzzin'

Saving stamps was an item, Redeemed-they got lea-cart and clock But the home stores quit giving, So that venture hit a rock.

The feas and bazears and handwork, Now seem to be all in the past, As members now give money, The die of tithing is cast.

A new year is in the offing. It's challenge ever nigh. Once more they face the future, With head and purpose high.

The Women's Missionary Society of Trinity Evangelical Church was organized May 27, 1896 with six charter members. Mrs. R. W. Teichman was the president. The purpose of the organization was to study the mission fields at home and abroad and their needs of financial assistance. The Society was instrumental in starting Mission Band in 1900 under Mrs. A. Oertli's leadership. A similar children's organization now called Boy's and Girl's Fellowship with Mrs. Freddle Kiemele in charge meets once a month. Little Heralds was organized by Irene Kraft in 1939, today it is called the Cradle Roll and Joy Geiger assumes the responsibility for this position. Alcie K. Well organized the Young People's Missionary Circle in 1938 with Gertrude Ouhl as president. There were 15 charter members. The Youth Fellowship organization this year has ten members with Bret Klemele as president.

In 1938 Trinity and Zion churches merged but they continued their separate societies. In 1947 the national Society merged and was called Women's Society of World Service (WSWS). Mrs. Gordon Well (Marle) was president when Trinity and Zion joined to become one general unit containing three individual circles in 1959. Another name change occurred when the Trinity and Methodist Church merged in 1966 called Women's Society of Christian Service (WSCS). The organization is now called Trinity United Methodist Women (TUMW).

Former presidents of the General Society were Mrs. Helen Gunter, Mrs. Lydia Restemayer, Mrs. Norb Restemayer, Mrs. Nell McGillivray, Mrs. Ray Farrow and Mrs. Emery Hartz.

District officers from our group were Hazel Restemayer and Betty McGillivray. Conference officer now is Betty McGillivray.
